Highlights

- An evaluation of a parenting intervention specific to autism and/or disability.
- Attendance was associated with improvements in parental competence and child behaviour.
- Parents recruited to the study broadly matched the ethnically diverse local population.
- High attendance levels and low drop-out rates suggest the intervention was acceptable to parents.
- Some parents may need support to generalise the newly learnt parenting skills and strategies.
